

GUIDELINES ON HOW TO CHOOSE ADVANCED ELECTIVES

Students seeking a Bachelor's degree need 42 advanced hours to graduate. If you do not meet this number with the required courses in your major, minor or core, then you will need something called advanced electives to help satisfy this requirement. These are courses at the 3000 or 4000 level that you get to choose.

How do you select an advanced elective?

- Look for courses that do not require any prerequisites that you have not completed.
- Stay away from courses that are for **majors only**.
- Choose courses that interest you and can broaden your knowledge base.
